## How we talk about addiction matters

Giving voice to the public health crisis of addiction starts with the words we use. The stigma of the disease keeps many of our neighbors from seeking the treatment they need. Addict, user, junkie and other negative labels for those living with addiction are not only inaccurate, they're harmful and a barrier to care.
